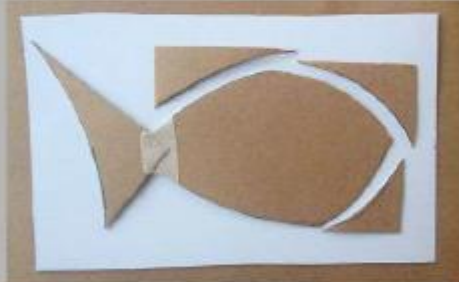

\* This idea is what I call a 'Pure Make' ... this means that you can use every scrap of the original start materials without any mess or left-overs, a little game for you.



1 - Draw out a leaf shape as big as you can fit on the card.



2 - Cut out the pieces but make sure you keep all four corners.

3 - Use one of the corners for a tail ...



... then use the other corners for fins.



4 - Draw around your thumb for a mouth.



5 - Cut the mouth shape out, cut a slit in it and make a cone for an eye.

6 - Use straws, matchsticks, corrugated card or any other scrap materials to add details.



7 - Attach a stick, cane or skewer to hold it by.



8 - Paint

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# Toilet Roll Bird



\* I've based this on a Hummingbird, you can use any bird you like, but you might need a photo to look at?

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1 - Cut a toilet roll tube in half lengthways, keep one half and cut the other like this ...



2 - Fix the body shape on ...



then cut the other part in two diagonally. Use one part for the head and the other for a tail.

3 - From the saved half of the tube cut a beak shape and tape it on.



4 - I often scribble over the tape ... this makes the outline clearer ...



... and pushes the tape down.



4 - From the remaining tube make wing shapes, cut the rest into strips.



6 - From the last strips cut out thin legs, and chop out little toes ...



7 - Roll up some tape or tin-foil into a ball for an eye ...



... and make a socket to hold it in.



5 - Use these strips to make wing and tail feathers, save a few.

8 - Paper mache the background to hide the tape.

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# Cardboard Tube Dragon



1 - Cut some cardboard tubes in half lengthways.



2 - Cut a slit in one piece for the body.



3 - Push this into shape and attach it to the base.

4 - Cut out a 'tail' and a 'neck' piece. Cut slits all the way down both edges to make them flexible ...



... then tape these into position.

5 - Use another half tube for the head ... cut a slit for a mouth ...



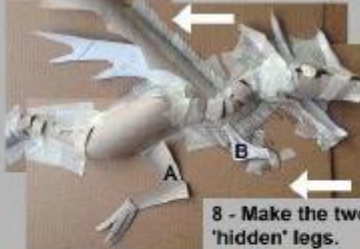
Rolled-up tape.

... and one for the eye.



6 - Add ears and horns.

7 - Add two wings.



8 - Make the two 'hidden' legs.



9 - Then make the two 'visible' legs.



10 - Use any of the leftover tubes to make spikes.

... you could even use some to make flames to come out of the mouth.



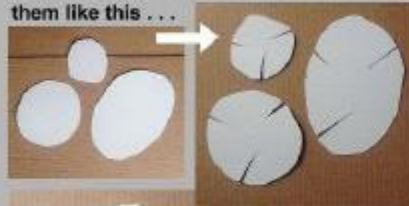
# Cardboard Bugs

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... instructions on next photo

You can do any insect using this method, you just need a photo to of it help you ...  
1 - Cut the shapes you need for the body and head from thin card, then cut slits in them like this ...



2 - Pull these discs into 3D shapes and attach them to a base.

3 - Find some materials that you can use for legs ... straws, canes, matches, cocktail sticks, anything that's thin enough.



4 - Break or snip the legs to make them the right shape.



Do the legs on the 'hidden' side first and one antenna.



5 - Make the legs on the 'visible' side of the body and attach them along with the second antenna.



6 - You can cut wings from card or, if you've got some garden wire you can wrap this with clear tape.



7 - Roll up a bit of tin foil or paper to make a simple oval eye shape.



8 - Before painting I glue ripped up card onto the base to hide any tape that shows.

# Cardboard Tube Zebra

... instructions on next photo

1 - Cut some cardboard tubes in half lengthways and fix one in the centre of a cardboard base.

2 - Cut slits in the back of this tube and pull it together to make it rounder.

3 - Use two more pieces of tube for the neck and the head and also snip out a 'V' shape for the mouth.

4 - Cut out three 'leaf shapes', two for the ears and a larger one for the tail ... make the thinner part of the tail by winding up some of the tape.

\* Fold the base up to make it look more 3D ...

6 - Then cut out two longer legs to go on the 'visible' side of the body. Cut a slit in the top to pull them into a 3D shape ...

... then fix these on.

5 - Make two legs to go on the 'hidden' side of the body.

7 - I've used the off-cuts to make a brow, a nostril, a mane and extra fur for the tail.

8 - Roll up an extra piece of tape for the eye.

9 - You can paint this or you glue the stripes on using black paper strips?
