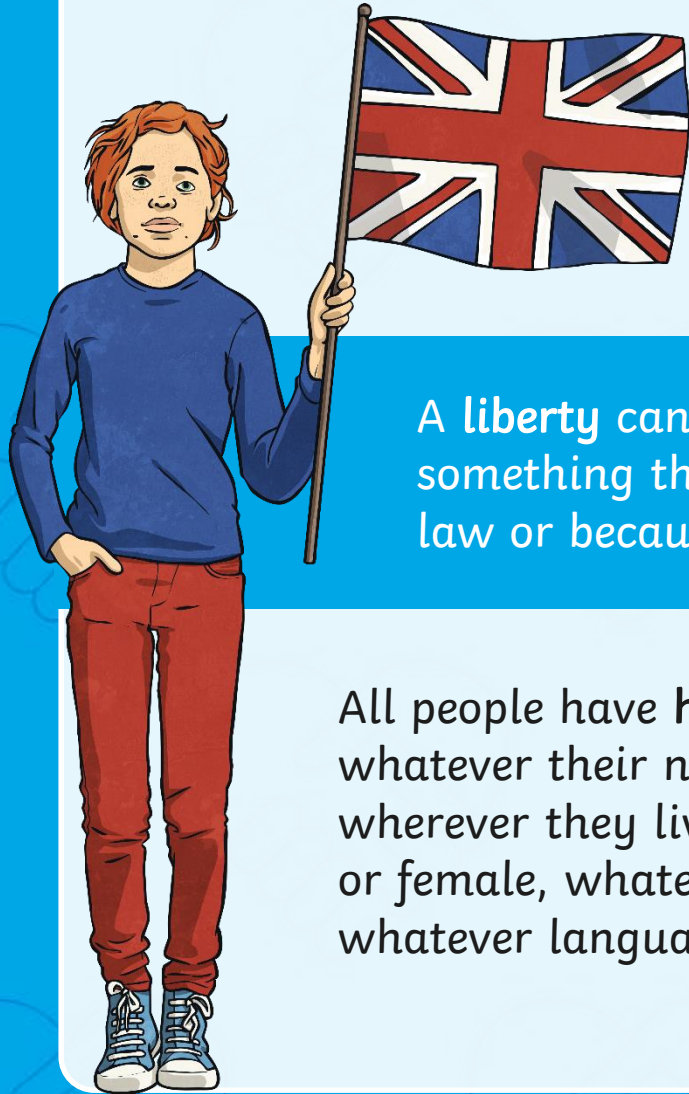

What Liberty Means to Us

Human Rights



Liberty means being free. In Britain, we have the freedom to make our own choices and live in a way we choose to. This is something to be celebrated!

A **liberty** can also mean a right or privilege. A **right** is something that all living things should have, because it's the law or because it's the right thing.

All people have **human rights**, whatever their nationality or age, wherever they live, if they are male or female, whatever they believe or whatever language they speak.



Human Rights

The **United Nations**, which is a group of countries who work together, created the **Universal Declaration of Human Rights**. This was made to make sure the rights of all people are protected.

Britain is a member of the United Nations. This means British people are **protected** by human rights and that the British government works hard to make sure that the British people have their human rights met. The Human Rights Act is a UK law passed in 1998.

Children have their own special rights that are set out in this declaration.

How wonderful that we live in a country that wants the best for us and wants us to be safe and happy!

We all have a right to have our own things; nobody should take our things from us without a good reason.



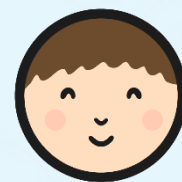
No Torture

Why is it a good thing to have human rights?

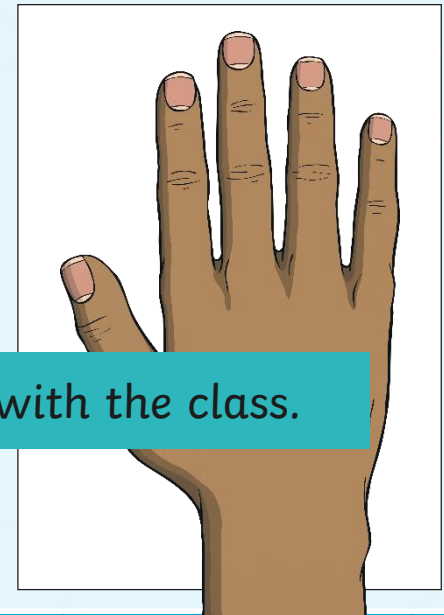
