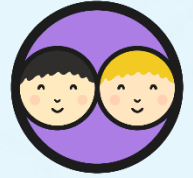

Write your thoughts on your sticky note.

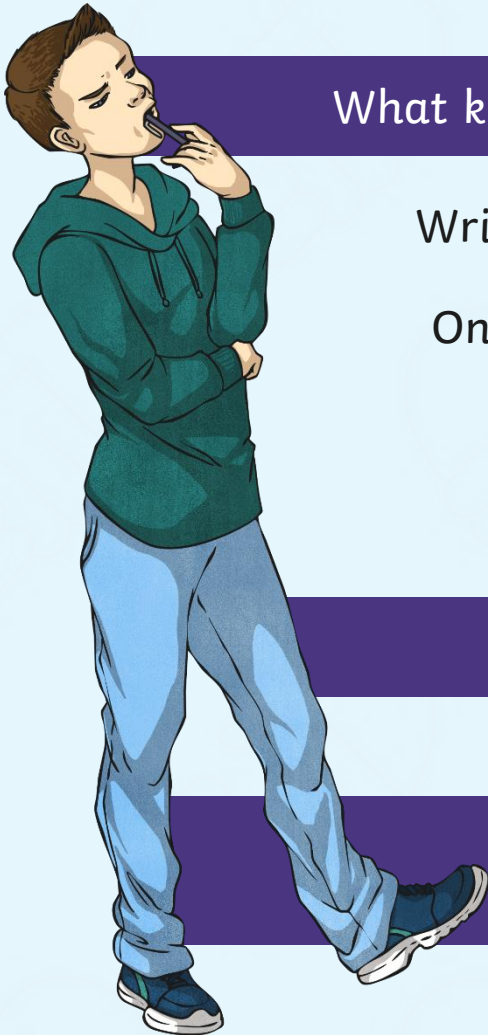
Once you have finished, stick your note onto the large piece of paper.

Religion and Ethnicity



Britain is a diverse society.

The data tables below show the range of religions and ethnicities represented in Britain. The information was gathered in the 2011 Census.

Black/African/ Caribbean/Black British	3%
Asian/Asian British	8%
White	86%
Mixed/Multiple Ethnic Groups	2%
Other Ethnic Group	1%

Religion	Percentage of the Population
Muslim	5%
Sikh	1%
No Religion	25%
Hindu	2%
Christian	59%
Jewish	1%
Not Stated	7%

We can smile and be friendly to all people, wherever they come from or whatever they do.

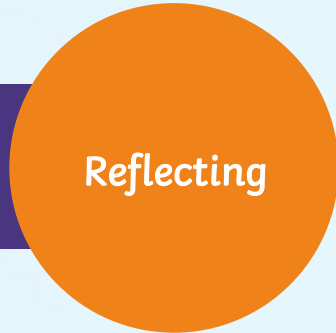
We can take time to find out about people, asking them questions about their chosen way of life.

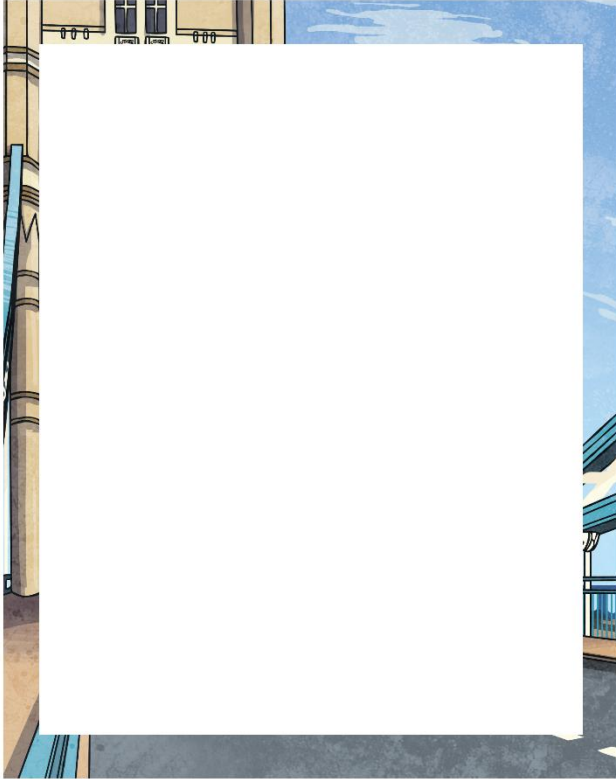
