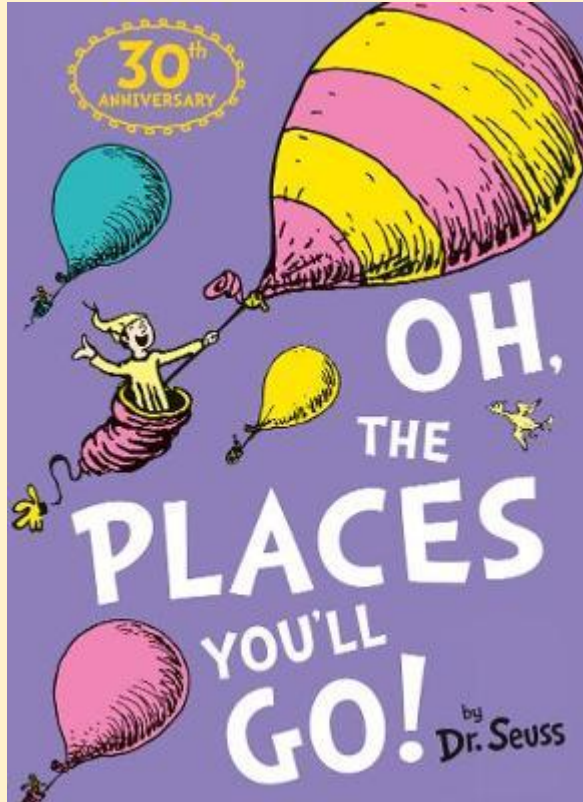

Summarise



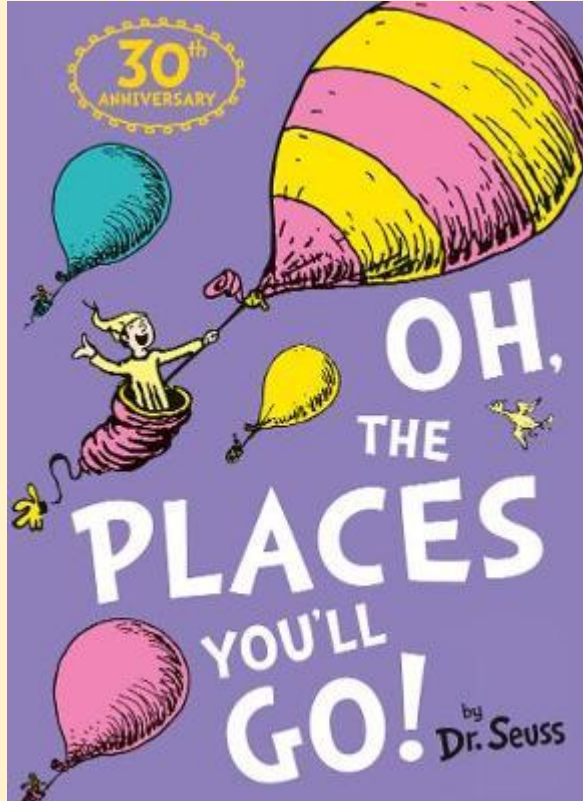
*I'm sorry to say so but, sadly, it's true

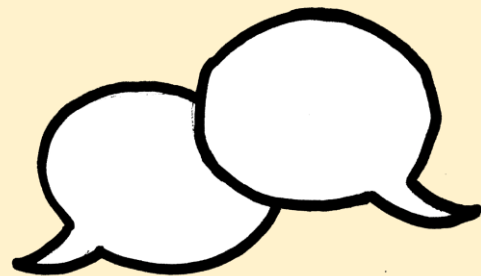
Quick Start Challenge

How much can you lose? How much can you win?'*

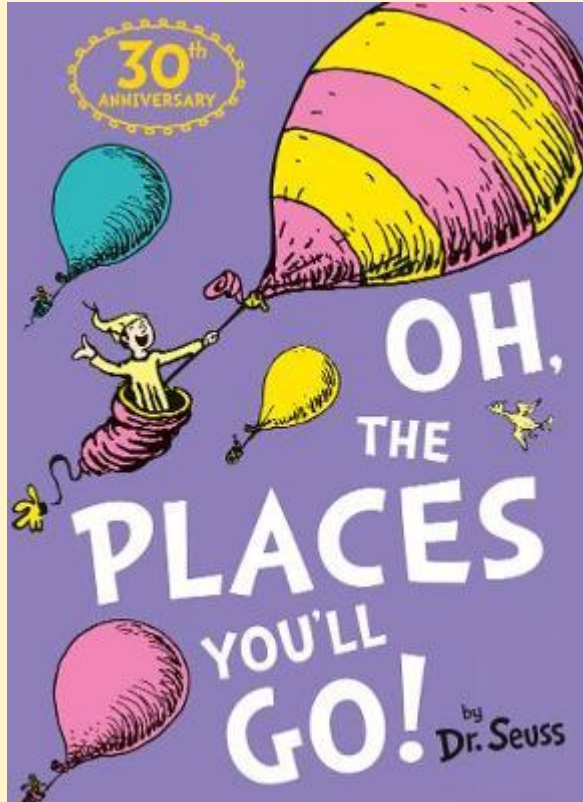
What is the significance of the four questions in relation to the poem's meaning?

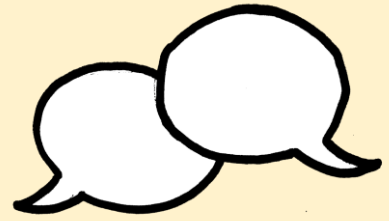


Vocabulary Check
